


Coaches' Notes - November 2021

Sturgeon Heights' staff hope that you had a wonderful fall break this month. With our recent dump of snow, we are presently enjoying that time of year when cuddling-up with comfort snacks and a great book can be a treasured time.

Wellness Coach News

Ms. Johansson has continued her visits to all classes for social-emotional learning lessons. Primary students continue to learn about emotional regulation through the Kimochi program. Elementary and junior high students are working on self-awareness and awareness of others through learning about values. We have done discussions and activities based on the "What Matters" materials by Danielle Reed, "Coach on the Go" The strategies we learn will be used for conflict resolution and building positive relationships throughout the year. For "Anti-bullying Week" (November 15-19), students played a game of Values Bingo to learn more about the values of their classmates.



Primary students will be sorting the Kimochis (feelings) and creating a class "Kimochi meter" we can use for checking in with our emotions each day and as a tool for conflict resolution. They will talk in their groups about which feelings are "hard to have" and which ones are "easier to have" to help them build emotional self-awareness. Each week, primary "kindness detectives" report on how their class has been doing with showing kindness and using skills we are learning in class.

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
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Learning Coaches' News

Differentiated instruction supports the wide variety of background knowledge, skills, and attitudes that students bring to each different learning opportunity. Sturgeon Heights' K-4 teachers work tirelessly to provide students with differentiated programming that addresses the learning levels of each student in their classrooms. One goal of teachers is to develop expert learners that know their own strengths and challenges when it comes to learning new things. Thank you for participating in parent-teacher interviews at the beginning of the month, so teachers can hear about your child from multiple perspectives. We make a great team.

As Learning Coach for grades 5-9, Ms. Johansson continues to support teachers with assistive technology use in their classrooms. Students are learning how to use speech to text and text to speech applications to help them with various stages of their school work. For example, in the brainstorming stage of a writing assignment, a small group can use the speech to text tools to record their conversation, and then go back to clean up the lists of ideas they generated for use in creating their outlines and drafts. Grade 5 to 9 classes are receiving a few sets of microphone headsets that can be used by students in the cohort for better sound clarity when working on individual work with speech to text.



Ms. Johansson has also enjoyed working with grade 6 students on a reading comprehension strategy called "Signposts" based on the work of Robert Probst and Kaylene Beer. This strategy helps readers to stay focused on the story and notice important details as they read. 6M will be finishing up a novel study with some differentiated student projects in the next few weeks. Our junior high students have also continued to use these strategies for their novel study this fall. All classes have used the Jamboard, a virtual whiteboard app, for recording their answers in groups or as a class.

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TIPS and TOOLS for student learning:




November has been a busy month for Trustees with two conferences and numerous meetings. The month saw the release of two important Division documents, the 2020 – 2021 Alberta Education Results Report (AERR) and the 2020 – 2021 Audited Financial Statements. Both will be available shortly on the Division website at www.sturgeon.ab.ca and I encourage everyone to view them.

Our first Fall Break received a positive review and it is being considered again for next year. There was strong support from our School Council that the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, September 30, be recognized as a holiday for students and staff for next year. Thank you to everyone for providing feedback.

WEATHER:
